July on-the-water Club Meeting: Monday, July 20th at 6:15 p.m. Upper Pawtuxet River- Hope, RI

This trip begins at Hope Landing and meanders northward to the source of the river—the 109-foot Gainer Memorial Dam at the Scituate Reservoir. The water is very clean and cold, emerging directly from the depths of the reservoir. Paddlers will return to the take-out. .

Leaders are Cheryl Thompson Cameron and Benn Thompson, stonefoxfarm@juno.com or 401-647-5887. The Hope Landing access has plenty of parking and an easy put-in.

Directions: *From Providence*, take Route 6W to the intersection with Route 116 in North Scituate. Take 116S to the village of Hope, in the town of Scituate. Just past the junction at Route 115, cross the bridge and turn right onto Hope Furnace Road. The access to Hope landing is down a short gravel drive.

From the north, take 295S to Route 6W and follow directions above.

From the south: Take Route 95N to 117W. Go right onto 116N (Knotty Oak Road) to the village of Hope, in the town of Scituate. The access, on Hope Furnace Road, will be on your left just after entering Scituate, before the bridge crossing the river. Drive down the short gravel drive to the landing.

- The trip schedule shown in the newsletter can (and will) change at any time after publication. Trips will be added, cancelled, changed, moved or otherwise adjusted for a variety of reasons. Check the message boards and trip calendars frequently (and always prior to leaving for a trip) for changes. Sign up for the email lists to have information delivered to you.
- To clear up the confusion about launch times: in the case of club paddles, “launch” means “in your boat, ready to paddle,” which is not the same as “launching your car into a parking space at the put-in.”
- Due to space constraints, the newsletter may show only abbreviated directions to the put-ins. More detailed directions may be found on the web site.
- Acquaint yourself with our web site, www.ricka.org! Click on the buttons for the category of your choice: flatwater, sea kayak or whitewater. You’ll find a wealth of information, including the specific gear and experience requirements for each.
- PFDs are always required; lights are required for all evening trips.

Educate yourself about the area in which you will be paddling, and carry appropriate gear, clothing, water, food, etc. Always check the weather forecast before launching. **YOU ALONE ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR MAKING THE DECISION TO LAUNCH YOUR BOAT.**

(Liberty Travel, Mobil station) go straight across onto Old Westport Rd. At the fork, bear left (it's more like straight) onto Chase Road and continue to end (about 3.5 mi.)

At the end (Russells mills Rd) take a right, go about 1 mile. Watch for Davoll's Store - yellow building on left. Take the left after the store, which begins Horseneck Rd. About 1/4 mi. down you will see the Town Landing Launch on left near tennis courts and a dirt parking area.

The Slocum River is one of the most beautiful salt water rivers in New England. The level 2 trip will explore the river and possibly venture into Little River. The level 3 trip will exit the Slocum

River and explore the coast before returning by way of Allen's Pond.

There will be one section where Rt-228 takes a major right hand jog. When you come to Rt-3A turn left. Turn into the first parking lot for the beach.

Northern Forest Canoe Trail: Errol to Groveton, NH

It was a long, dark drive up to Errol, New Hampshire. Chuck Horbert, Mike Bussell and Bill “Wet Willie” Luther had left earlier in the day so they could scout out the river. I had to work, and didn’t leave Waltham, Massachusetts until after 6:00 PM – right in the middle of rush hour traffic.

It was already dark when I got through the Franconia Notch. I followed Route 3 north toward Groveton, and then I took Route 110 along the Upper Ammonoosuc River toward Errol. It was getting late, and I was anxious to get to the hotel. For several miles, I was stuck behind a van going very slowly, even for this remote area. When we finally hit a straight section of road, I sped past – big mistake.

I wasn’t more than a quarter-mile down the road when something big ran out in front of me. I slammed on the brakes and laid on the horn. Fortunately, I stopped in time. In the middle of the road in front of me stood a large female moose. After a few seconds she lost interest and trotted off into the woods. Now I know why that van was moving so slowly.

For the past couple of years, Chuck, Mike and Bill have been paddling their way through sections of the Northern Forest Canoe Trail. Covering 740 miles, the Northern Forest Canoe Trail links rivers and lakes across northern New York and New England from Old Forge, New York to Fort Kent, Maine. I had been invited to join their trips several times in the past, but always had a conflict. When they told me that their next trip would be the Androscoggin and the Upper Ammonoosuc in New Hampshire, I decided that I had to go. The Androscoggin was the first whitewater river that I ran with my dad in 1990.

My first day started early – breakfast with Bill at 7:00 AM. After breakfast, Jim Cole

and Tommy Taylor met us at the hotel. We got on our gear and headed off to the river. We would be paddling 16 miles down the Androscoggin River. The Androscoggin starts in Errol and runs 178 miles across New Hampshire and Maine until it empties into the Kennebec River. The section we would be paddling includes the Thirteen Mile Woods - one of the prettiest sections of the river.

We shuttled our cars and put-in below the dam in Errol around 9:30 AM. The river starts off with some class II rapids, and then alternates between flatwater, quickwater and easy whitewater down to the Pontook Dam. For much of the morning it was pouring rain – I mean POURING - but that didn’t dampen our spirits. The rain came and went, and we had a great time. Along the way we saw lots of wildlife including osprey, loons, heron, and even a bald eagle. I must admit, on such a cold rainy day, it was nice to go back to the hotel for a hot shower after the paddle. That’s what I call roughing it.

The second day of our trip was a 9-mile run on the Upper Ammonoosuc. We shuttled our cars down to the take-out in the village of Stark. Stark sits at the base of a steep granite cliff called The Pulpit. With its picturesque covered bridge over the Upper Ammonoosuc, it is one of the prettiest New England villages that I have seen.

The Upper Ammonoosuc is much smaller than the Androscoggin. It twists and turns through cow fields and woodlands across the top of NH until it ultimately empties into the Connecticut River. The previous day’s rain had brought the level up nicely. The river was mostly quickwater with lots of maneuvering needed to get through the twists and turns. The day ended with a couple of class II rapids as we entered the village of Stark. We had a good time playing in the rapids, and only had to pull our boats on shore to be home for the night at the Stark Inn Bed & Breakfast.

Unfortunately, this would be the end of my trip. I needed to leave early to be

Kayaker aiding duck rescued from mud

HARWICH - A tender-hearted kayaker found himself waist deep in mud yesterday after he and his son tried to rescue a duckling.

It began around 2:30 p.m. off Chase Road in Harwich when the man and his son - whose names were not released by the police or fire department - spotted a young duck stuck on the clam flats with a clam shell stuck to its leg.

They rescued the duck but as they approached shore, it got away from them, according to a fire department spokesman.

The father went after the duckling and soon found himself waist-deep in mud.

Harwich firefighters and police were called to the scene and firefighter Robert Sanders slid out on a rescue surfboard to rescue the man.

No injuries to human or duck were reported.

By the time Bill and Tommy put-in on Saturday morning, the river had dropped a foot from the previous day’s level, but there was still plenty of water. From Stark to Groveton, the river was a mix of quickwater and class I rapids with two dams – one they ran, one they portaged. The day ended at another picturesque covered bridge in Groveton.

What’s next on the schedule? There’s talk of something in Vermont – lots of uncharted territory up there. The guys have 530 miles to go. I hope I’ll be able to make a few more of their trips.

'It was more embarrassment than real danger,' spectator says of mishap

New England Patriots star Tom Brady had to be rescued from the Charles River after flipping his kayak on Sunday, the Boston Herald reported Tuesday.

"He had to be rescued," an unidentified spectator told the Boston Herald. "The launch guy went out and got him and got him back in the kayak. He's been bragging about it ever since. He's telling everyone he rescued Tom Brady."

After Brady suffered the mishap on the rented kayak, a boathouse attendant went out to rescue the quarterback, the Herald said.

Brady and wife Gisele Bundchen rented two kayaks for a leisurely ride on the river, the Herald said.

"It was more embarrassment than real danger," the spectator said.

RICKA does not assign ratings to paddlers. We assign difficulty levels to our trips. A trip’s difficulty rating is a guide for judging if you have the skills to participate in a trip.

Every paddler must decide for themselves to participate in a group trip. Your decision should be based on some of the following considerations: the difficulty level of the trip; the forecasted weather conditions; your skill and experience level; your comfort level with the other participants

Every paddler that decides to participate in a group trip shares responsibility for the safety of the group as a whole.

Level 1: No previous kayak experience required.

Level 2: Participants should be able to:

Paddle 6 miles in a day.

Perform a wet exit.

Perform an assisted deep water rescue.

Maintain a heading for short distances without the use of a rudder.

Turn a kayak using forward and reverse sweep strokes.

Level 3: Participants should be able to:

Perform skills listed under Level 2.

Paddle 13 miles in a day.

Control a kayak in 15- to 20-knot winds.

Feel comfortable in 2-3 foot waves.

Handle SURF and BEACH LANDINGS.

Level 4: Participants should be able to:

Perform the skills listed under Level 3.

Paddle 15 miles in a day.

Control a kayak in 20 knot winds.

Handle large ocean swells.

Level 5: Participants should be able to:

Perform the skills listed under Level 4.

Paddle 20+ miles in a day.

Control a kayak in 25 knot winds.
