May Club Meeting Rhode Island Oyster Gardeners

Monday, May 17th, 7 pm Jewish Community Center,

401 Elmgrove Avenue, Providence

Started in the summer of 2006, the Rhode Island Oyster Gardening for Restoration and Enhancement program (RI-OGRE) is working to restore the oyster population in Narragansett Bay. The oysters are expected to improve water quality through their filtering processes, provide essential habitat for a variety of estuarine and marine organisms whose populations have also declined, and eventually mature into adult populations capable of providing future generations of these important bivalve mollusks.

RI-OGRE Coordinator Steve Patterson will present a slide show and bring along several representative oysters and some visual aids and brochures about this important project to restore the health of Narragansett Bay.

Directions to the Jewish Community Center:

- The companionship of other RICKA members who are often knowledgeable paddlers, historians, ecologists, biologists, naturalists, etc. I cannot count the number of interesting people I have met on RICKA paddles.
- Club-subsidized reduced-cost or free training by certified instructors. RICKA sponsors two annual rolling clinics, plus sea kayak, flatwater and whitewater skills sessions and classes (see announcements in this issue under Club Events & Activities).

- Free help for the asking. Most paddlers will be happy to give you suggestions on how you can paddle more effectively and improve your skills.
- The monthly RICKA *Paddler* newsletter.
- Motivation to get out there and paddle. It is wonderful exercise that uses all your big muscles (stomach, legs, shoulders) when you do it correctly. It also burns tremendous calories per hour. Belonging to RICKA helps get you out there.
- Because RICKA is now part of the American Canoe Association (ACA), you get a reduced cost membership in the ACA, should you desire, as well.
- RICKA discounts at many local outfitters (see Page
- With the various RICKA divisions of Flatwater, Sea Kayaking, and White Water, you can also check out other forms of paddling you may have an interest in. They all have paddles requiring lower skills for people new to that form of paddling.
- For an additional \$10 you can also belong to the *Blackstone Valley Paddlers* a special part of RICKA oriented to beginning paddlers Tuesday evenings. You get a great deal of individual attention while learning about the beautiful Blackstone Valley. This is how I learned. It is a great deal. They can even coordinate kayak rentals (see announcement on Page 4)

Most importantly, your membership helps keep RICKA going, organizing paddles for all kinds of styles, helping many many people enjoy the water and our natural environment.

Join the RICKA Flatwater Group for a spring cleaning of the waterway that is the heart of Providence. This should be a fun day that will make a big difference to all of us who enjoy the rivers in downtown Providence. Both BlueWays and Woonasquatucket people said they would be joining us.

Our plan is to do as much as we can that morning. We will finish by 1:00 PM at the latest. Each boat will take a trash bag and I will direct you to an area to clean up. REQUIREMENTS: PFDs required, suitable for all boats, no special skills needed. The water is still cold this time of year, so wear insulation or bring a change of clothes in a waterproof bag.

Basic Whitewater Course

The RICKA Whitewater Group will be holding a Class II Whitewater Kayak Course on July 17 and 18, 2010. The course will be taught by ACA certified whitewater instructor Mike Rock and will be free for qualified RICKA and ACA members. If you are not an ACA member, there will be a one-time \$5 event membership fee.

In this course, participants will learn and refine the techniques needed to paddle in class II whitewater. After a review of the basic strokes on flatwater, we will head to the river to work on eddy turns, peelouts and ferries. We will also cover river reading and basic river safety. The class will be held on the Deerfield River in western Massachusetts.

While this is a beginner whitewater course, it is not for novice paddlers. You must be able to handle self rescues (wet exits) and already know the basic strokes. Previous moving water experience is a plus. Participants must provide their own equipment including a whitewater kayak, sprayskirt and helmet. Recreational kayaks are not allowed in this class.

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A Spring Day on the Upper Millers Text and Photos by Erik Eckilson

It started off like many RICKA Whitewater trips with an early morning stop at the McDonald's off Route 146 in Uxbridge. I wanted to get a sausage biscuit, but settled for milk to go with the cereal that I brought from home – a little healthier start to a busy day.

I was one of six RICKA boaters that were meeting at the McDonald's before heading up to the Millers River in north central Massachusetts. The Millers arises in southern New Hampshire and flows southward, and then westward through Massachusetts before emptying into the Connecticut River.

There are two sections of the Millers that are popular for whitewater boating – the upper section from South Royalston to Athol (class II - III), and the lower section from Erving to Millers Falls (class II - IV). On this day, RICKA had groups running both sections. I was in the group paddling the upper section.

Mike, Jeff, Eric and I arrived at the put in on the upper section of the Millers around 10:00 to find Andy, Steve and the two Tommy's waiting for us. After a few quick hellos, we unloaded our boats and ran the shuttle. Everyone knew that there would be plenty of time to get acquainted (or re-acquainted) on the river.



The Upper Millers is a beautiful section of river that alternates between rock gardens and long wave trains. With the exception of a couple of railroad bridges, there is nothing to break the wilderness feeling of the river. The day started off overcast and windy, but the sun came out as we moved downstream.

We put in around 10:30 and the fun began immediately with a long class III rapid. I followed Mike into the rapid and bobbed through the 2 to 3 foot waves. About half way through the rapid I pulled into an eddy to get some pictures of the others coming downstream.

As I turned, I could see Andy approaching a nasty pour-over on river right. He paddled hard to avoid it, but didn't quite make it and got sucked back into the hydraulic. He side-surfed for a while, but eventually flipped. I saw him set up for a roll, but go back over again. There wasn't a second attempt. Within a few seconds, Andy was out of his boat and working his way to shore with the help of Tommy and Steve. He was quickly reunited with his gear and we heading back downstream.



We continued riding the waves and playing in the rock gardens for another couple of miles when we decided it was time for a break. We found a spot with a beach large enough to pull all the boats on shore and decided to have our lunch. As we were eating, a group from the RiverRunners Yahoo group pulled up to share our spot. Soon we were all talking and sharing paddling stories.

After lunch, we loaded up the boats and continued our trip downstream. Occasional sections of quickwater were interspersed with long wave trains and fun rock gardens. By the time we reached the take out in Athol, we were all pretty tired. Unfortunately, it was a long carry up a steep hill to get back to our cars. Everyone pitched in to get the gear up the hill, and then we pitched in to help the RiverRunners group that pulled in behind us.

I got home in time for dinner – tired, but excited about a great trip, and looking forward to the next.
