This month's paddle is at the scenic Wakefield Pond - a 74-acre pond which sits in the northwestern corner of Rhode Island on the border with Connecticut. Our leader for the evening will be long-time RICKA member and Flatwater Leader Henry Dziadosz. We will meet at the state boat ramp at 6:00 p.m. for a 6:30 p.m. launch. Changes or cancellation will be posted on the <u>flatwater message</u> board.

**Directions to Wakefield Pond:** From Providence, head north on Rt. 44. In Chepachet, you will bear right on to Rt. 100 and Rt.102. Go straight on Rt.100 after Rt. 102 splits off to the right. Follow Rt. 100 through downtown Pascoag. (left at bottom of hill, then next right - CVS will be on your left.) Follow for approximately three miles to sign showing Zambarano Hospital straight ahead, and Connecticut Rt. 12 to left. Bear left on Buck Hill Road. After passing fire tower on left, you will see Wakefield Road on left. Turn left on to Wakefield Road. Turn left onto Lee Street - the first left at the bottom of the hill. The state boat ramp is at the end of Lee Street. GPS 41°57'58.32" N 71°47'18.85" W

## DARING RESCUE FAILS ON ESOPUS CREEK

On June 6, 1992 the Rhode Island Canoe & Kayak Association suffered the only fatality in its 35-year history. Gordon McKinney drowned when his canoe was pinned against a bridge abutment during a high water run on Esopus Creek.

The Esopus Creek near Phonecia, NY is a popular class I-III whitewater run in the Catskill Mountains. It is normally a mellow class I-II run except for Railroad Rapid, which is a strong class III. The area had received 5" of rain the preceding day, and the river was running higher and faster than

usual. Gordon had been paddling whitewater with his wife for a little over a year. They were wearing wetsuits, PFD's, and helmets. They paddled an Old Town Tripper that was fully outfitted with thigh straps and float bags.

The group consisted of five people, all but one of whom had been down the river before. They ran the river slowly and carefully. The McKinneys took a short swim at Railroad Rapids, but were pulled out quickly by a group of AMC paddlers.

Several of the group eddied out above the Bridge Street bridge in Phonecia. The McKinney's canoe had swamped in waves just upstream, and they decided to run straight through to the takeout just below the bridge. No witnesses to the moment of impact were found, but the canoe wrapped

completely around one of the metal bridge piers. The boat was completely under water in what onlookers called the worst pin they had ever seen. McKinney 's wife washed free, but Gordon remained trapped between the boat and the bridge pier.

Dozens of paddlers, four rescue squads and two ambulance teams were eventually required to free McKinney from the pin. He was immediately transported to Kingston Hospital where he was pronounced dead. Gordon remains to this day the only RICKA member to die in a paddling incident. Lets keep it that way.

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## Paddling the Four Seasons

I love to paddle. I love to be on or near water. For most people, the paddling season starts in May and ends when it starts to get cold. Since it was such a mild winter, the paddling season for many of us didn't end. For this reason, I was fortunate to become a member of the "Twelve Month Club"; a group of us who paddled at least one day in each of the twelve months. Paddling the twelve months, or the four seasons, made me aware of how much beauty there is to behold in each season.

#### **Spring**

The Earth awakens with new growth. Birds come back and start their calls. Buds start to appear on the trees and other flora along the rivers. No longer can I see the long distances that I was able to see when the leaves were totally gone. Colors reappear after taking their winter naps. The waters are running a bit faster with the thaw of the snows and the spring rains. It is breathtaking to be an onlooker in this renewing process and truly remarkable to witness Mother Nature at work. Spring launches into summer as boats start launching into the waters.

#### Summer

## Wood/Pawcatuck Camping

It only takes me a few minutes to pack for a business trip – throw a few clothes in the overnight bag and hope for the best. That was not the case as I prepared for Wilderness group's first camping trip. I checked the <a href="Gear List">Gear List</a> on the <a href="Resource">Resource</a> page of the <a href="Wilderness site">Wilderness site</a> and spent a couple of weeks getting my gear together.

Tent – check  $\sqrt{.}$ Sleeping bag and pad – check  $\sqrt{.}$ Campstove and freeze-dried meals – I'm not big on freeze-dried food, but check  $\sqrt{.}$ 

RICKA's first Wilderness camping trip was intended to be a test-run and training trip for experienced paddlers who are interested in expanding into extended camping trips in places like the North Maine Woods or the Northern Forest Canoe Trail. The trip was on a pleasant section of the Wood/Pawcatuck River from Hopkinton (Dow Field) to Bradford Landing. We would camp at the paddle-in campsites at the Burlingame State Park. Each paddler would be expected to have the gear and skills necessary to negotiate three portages (Hope Valley, Woodville and Alton), numerous blow-downs and anything else that nature might throw at them.

As it turned out, weather would not be an issue. The forecast was for days to be sunny and in the high 70's. Nights would fall to the low 50's. With such nice weather, we were concerned that all the Burlingame campsites might be full before we got there. We had six paddlers – five campers and one day-tripper.

After running the shuttle, we put-in on the Wood River behind the ball field at Dow Field. The river starts of narrow, and we

immediately had two large blow-downs to contend with. The first required that we get out of our boats, the second we were able to get around from the water. We got real good at dealing with blow-downs since we would find many more as we continued downstream.

Our first portage of the day was just downstream at the dam for the old Hope Valley Mill. This became a familiar process as well. Trip one – take the bags. Trip two – take the boat. We portaged on the left and put-in in the quickwater below the dam. Just below the Old Hope Mill is another low dam at the gauging station. Fortunately, the river was high enough that we were able to run this dam.

By this time we had been on the river for a couple of hours, but had only traveled about a mile downstream. Hopefully the rest of the trip would go faster. We stopped for lunch at the Switch Road Landing before continuing our trip.

Below Switch Road, the river is wooded and scenic with a few more blow-downs that we were able to negotiate from the boat. The river turned more marsh-like as we approached the second portage at the Woodville Dam. A cart would have made this portage easier, but I didn't have one, so ... trip one take bags, trip two take boat.

Below the Woodville Dam is a lovely section of river with deeper water and good current. We found a few mountain Swamp Azaleas blooming in this area – I'm not

sure if they were early or late, but they were pretty.

As we approached the final portage at the Alton Dam, we could see that a large group of boy scouts had already gathered at the take-out. We carried through the group, along the way learning that they also planned to camp at the Burlingame canoe sites. We put-in down a steep bank at the bottom of the dam, and once we got back on the water, regrouped to discuss out plans for the night.

Knowing now that the Burlingame campsites would be crowded, we decided to change our plans and camp a little further upstream at a pleasant pine grove with a large fire pit. There was plenty of room for three tents and two hammocks. After setting up camp, we took a walk to view the nearby osprey nests, gathered some firewood and cooked supper. After that, there was noting left to do except sit back and enjoy the campfire.

On Sunday, we broke camp early and began our trip down to Bradford Landing. We ran the broken dam at Burdickville and stopped to check out the Burlingame campsites. While there were some open sites, we all agreed that we made the right decision to camp upstream.

We continued downstream to Bradford which was the official end of our trip. Jim and I decided to extend the trip a little longer and continue down the Pawcatuck to check out the Grills Preserve of the Westerly Land Trust just downstream. It was pleasant paddle down, but a little more work paddling back up to our cars.

I arrived home around 1:00 and had time to enjoy the rest of the weekend. Thanks to Jim Cole, Wilderness Chair, for organizing this great camping trip.
