Monday, June 18, 2012 at 6:00 p.m.

Our first "Meeting on the Water" is the signal that summer is finally here! For those new to the club, a group paddle replaces RICKA's more structured meetings in the months of June, July and August. It's a great chance to get together with fellow paddlers at a location that is suitable for everyone.

This month's paddle will be held at Hundred Acre Cove in Barrington. Hundred Acre Cove sits just north of the confluence of the Barrington and Palmer Rivers and is the third largest salt marsh estuary in Rhode Island. It's a pleasant place to paddle in an area teaming with birds and wildlife. Our

Directions to Hundred Acre Cove: The put-in for Hundred Acre Cove and the Barrington River is on Route 114 (Wampanoag Trail) in Barrington. Go south on Route 114 and take the last turnaround before Route 114 becomes a two-way road. (If you miss it, no problem- just go through the next intersection and turn around in the parking lot of the Congregational Church. It's impossible to miss.) Just after the turnaround (you're now heading north), you'll see a sign on the right that says Walker Farm – turn in. This is the town dock and boat ramp. Park anywhere that's not posted.

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An Interview with **RICKA President Andrew (AJ) Barbato**

What is the Rhode Island Canoe & Kayak Association?

The Rhode Island Canoe & Kayak Association, also known as RICKA, is one of the oldest and largest paddle sport clubs in southeastern New England. For 35 years, RICKA has provided recreational paddling opportunities for its members and friends from Rhode Island and across New England.

What type of paddling does RICKA do?

RICKA has four interest groups – <u>Flatwater</u>, <u>Whitewater</u>, <u>Sea Kayak</u> and <u>Wilderness</u>. These groups often overlap and many members paddle regularly with all four groups.

The <u>Flatwater</u> group is the largest of RICKA's four interest groups. Flatwater trips run the gamut from lakes and ponds, to rivers, to open water. Swimming, picnicking, and short hikes accompany some trips.

The <u>Whitewater</u> group is the smallest of RICKA's four interest groups. This group paddles whitewater rivers and streams across New England.

The <u>Sea Kayak</u> group is specifically focused on kayaking in coastal environments. These trips range in difficulty from novice to expert.

The <u>Wilderness</u> group is the newest of RICKA's four interest groups. The Wilderness group organizes trips that involve paddling, camping and other wilderness skills.

How do I find out about trips?

Last year, RICKA organized over 100 trips ranging from easy daytrips to weeklong excursions. Read the current Paddler or visit the <u>RICKA website</u> to explore the calendars and message boards of one or all of our paddling groups for scheduled trips and last minute changes.

Our affiliated club offers additional paddling trips unique to themselves. The <u>Blackstone Valley Paddle Club</u> (BVPC) is part of our flatwater group that works in conjunction with the <u>National Park Service</u> (NPS). They lead trips and provide basic training throughout the watershed of the Blackstone River from Worcester, MA to Providence, RI. Many trips include historical narration by either a Park Ranger or a member about the portion of river of that trip.

And our newest unaffiliated group <u>Southern New England Paddlers</u> (SNEP) offers similar paddle trips and training throughout southern RI and eastern CT, in conjunction with the <u>Wood Pawcatuck</u> <u>Watershed Association</u>. (See story on page 4.)

Do you provide training?

Training is an important part of the RICKA mission. Each year RICKA sponsors many fun and informative training sessions. These including our annual rolling clinic; <u>flatwater</u>, <u>whitewater</u> and <u>sea kayak</u> training; leadership training; first aid and CPR classes. Many of these sessions are offered free of charge, or at a significant discount to our members.

What else does RICKA do?

In addition to trips and training, RICKA produces eleven monthly issues of its outstanding newsletter the <u>Paddler</u>. We hold <u>monthly meetings</u> with interesting and informative speakers.

We also maintain the <u>websites</u>, message boards and email lists that keep you up-todate on trips and activities. Our <u>Library</u> contains an extensive collection of books and videos covering all aspects of paddling that are available to members.

You can buy or sell gear through the <u>RICKA Classified Ads</u>, and RICKA members also get special discounts at several area retailers - see page 7 for the complete listing.

RICKA is also a Paddle America Club with the <u>American Canoe Association</u> (ACA) – the country's largest paddle sport club. RICKA members can join the ACA at discounted annual rates of \$30 individual, \$40 family (regularly \$40 and \$60).

We now also schedule walking/hiking trips tailored to geocaching. And in the winter months have snowshoe-hiking trips throughout the area.

Should I join RICKA?

Yes – absolutely! If you like canoeing or kayaking, would like to meet new friends, paddle in new and interesting places in a friendly group atmosphere and are not a RICKA member, please join today – it's just \$15 for the entire family. The Upper Wood River By Erik Eckilson

After several weekends filled with yard work, I was really looking forward to getting out on the water. I had been thinking about heading up to the Deerfield in western MA until I saw a post on the <u>Flatwater Message Board</u> that Henry was planning a trip on the upper Wood River.

The Wood River is located southwestern Rhode Island and flows 25 miles from its source near Sterling, CT to the Village of Alton where is merges with the Pawcatuck. There are two sections of the Wood River which are popular with paddlers – the upper Wood River from Route 165 in Exeter to the Wyoming Dam, and the lower Wood River from Hope Valley Landing to Alton. I had done the lower section a couple of times in the past, but had never paddled the upper section, so the upper Wood River it would be.

I arrived at the put-in on Route 165 at around 10:00 and was surprised to see that most of the paddlers had already arrived. I was also surprised at the large number of canoes on this trip. In total there were 13 boats – 9 canoes and 4 kayaks. Maybe we should go back the club's old name – the Rhode Island Canoe Association.

We ran the shuttle and were on the water by 11:00. The river starts off narrow and shallow as it twists and turns through the woodlands of the <u>Arcadia Management</u> <u>Area</u>. The banks were lined with mountain laurel, honeysuckle and other flowering plants – very pretty.

The Wood River is also one of Rhode Island's most popular trout streams, and we passed several fishermen on our way down the river. The fishing must have been good on this day because all the fishermen seemed happy.

We continued through the woods for a couple of miles until the river opened up into marshy area known as Frying Pan Pond. A bald eagle soared overhead – the first I had seen in Rhode Island. There were also ducks, geese and turtles just about everywhere I looked.

We stopped for lunch at the Barberville Dam which is also the headquarters for the <u>Wood Pawcatuck Watershed</u> <u>Association</u> (WPWA). The WPWA is a great advocate for this watershed, and a partner with RICKA in the <u>Southern New</u> <u>England Paddlers</u>. (See story on right.)

After lunch, we portaged the Barberville Dam before continuing downstream. Most of the group portaged to the right which allowed them to avoid a tricky little rapid just below the dam. Chuck and I went left, and bounced out way down the rocks without difficulty. Chuck even ran the drop standing up!

Below the dam is a nice quickwater stretch until the river begins to widen into the impoundment for the Wyoming Dam known as Wyoming Pond. The pond is shallow and choked with weeds, and we paddled into a strong headwind until we reached the dam. With the trip complete, we got everyone back to their cars before heading home.

Southern New England Paddlers Resumes Wednesday Evening Paddles

If you like paddling in southern RI and eastern CT, this is the group for you.

Southern New England Paddlers (SNEP) explores a different waterway in southern New England each Wednesday evening from mid-May till early-September. Trips are planned at scenic sites that are both easy and relatively safe for new paddlers.

Membership is free, however we do encourage participants to join the <u>Rhode</u> <u>Island Canoe Kayak Association</u> (RICKA) and the <u>Wood Pawcatuck</u> <u>Watershed Association</u> (WPWA). Both these organizations offer other excellent paddling and outdoor activities.

All paddles start at 6:00 p.m. and end before sunset. Please arrive a couple minutes early if possible - we will be on the water by 6:15 p.m. at the latest. Since our paddles end close to sunset, a flashlight or headlamp is also recommended in case we do not get off the water before dark.

Rentals are available at select locations throughout the summer. If rentals are available, it will be noted in the trip description along with the phone number to call to reserve a kayak.

The first Tuesday of each month is training night at WPWA. You may bring your kayak and gear, or it will be provided to you with the training. The cost of training is a \$20 donation to WPWA.

Educate yourself about the area in which you will be paddling, and carry appropriate gear, clothing, water, food, etc. Always check the weather forecast before launching. YOU ALONE ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR MAKING THE DECISION TO LAUNCH YOUR BOAT.

Blackstone Valley Paddle Club Trips

A pleasant paddle in the Hopedale Pond.

We will put-in above the Albion Dam and paddle upstream to the Manville Dam and back.

The Conservation Corner Woonasquatucket River

The headwaters of the Woonasquatucket River are 300 feet above sea level at Primrose, in the town of North Smithfield. From there the river flows 19 miles to Providence where it joins the Moshassuck River to form the Providence River.

In 1998 President Clinton designated the Woonasquatucket River an American Heritage River - one of only fourteen in the nation. In 2001, the **Woonasquatucket River Watershed Council** (WRWC) was established to promote and protect this beautiful and historic watershed. Currently, the WRWC is working to restore river habitats and passages for shad, herring and other migrating fish on the lower reaches of the river. Bill Brown, a current RICKA member, monitors the fish ladder on the Woonasquatucket several times a week to count and log the number of fish moving upstream.

You can explore the Woonasquatucket River this summer with the WRWC on one of its <u>many paddles</u>. Email or call Erik at <u>etalley@wrwc.org</u> or (401) 481-1376 for more information on these trips.
