### **Elements of Kayak Design**

#### Monday, March 19, 2012 at 7:00 p.m.

At our March meeting, Nick Schade will provide an overview of kayak design in an easy to understand manner. He will describe the difference between kayak length and waterline length, why chines don't make much difference in stability, and many other topics to help new and experienced paddlers understand kayak design and get more out of their boats.

Nick is the owner of <u>Guillemot Kayaks</u> and author of <u>The Strip-Built Sea</u> <u>Kayak</u> - an instruction book describing the strip-built method that has helped foster a revival in the construction of wooden kayaks. The meeting will be held at the Jewish Community Center, 401 Elmgrove Avenue, Providence. All RICKA members in attendance will be entered into a

### An Interview with **RICKA Flatwater Chair Cheryl Thompson Cameron**

#### What is the RICKA Flatwater group?

RICKA has four interest groups -Flatwater, Whitewater, Sea Kayak and Wilderness. These groups often overlap and many members paddle regularly with all four groups. The Flatwater group is the largest of the four and holds trips on most weekends from late spring through fall.

#### What types of trips are there?

Flatwater trips run the gamut from lakes and ponds, to rivers, to open water. Swimming, picnicking, short hikes and geocaching accompany some trips.

#### How do I find out about trips?

You will find a list of trips on the flatwater website. http://www.ricka-flatwater.org/

You can also join the flatwater email list to get email notifications. http://groups.yahoo.com/group/RICKA FLATWATER/ioin

#### Who runs the trips?

All trips are run by volunteer trip coordinators. These coordinators will have done the trip before and will be able to advise you of potential hazards. Safety is always of paramount importance, but you, and you alone, are responsible for yourself.

#### How do I join a trip?

Most flatwater trips are "show and go" requiring no advanced notice. Simply arrive at the time indicated and enjoy the

trip. More difficult trips will require an RSVP.

#### What equipment do I need?

Every paddler will need a boat (canoe or kayak), paddle and personal floatation device (PFD). You can find a list of other equipment on the website. http://www.rickaflatwater.org/kayakgear.htm

#### What about clothing?

Paddling is a water sport, so you should plan to get wet. Cotton cloths should be avoided. Polypropylene, fleece, wool, and lycra blends insulate well when wet. In colder weather, a neoprene wetsuit is the better insulator, and splash jackets and dry wear are good investments.

#### And for my feet?

Footwear should protect your feet in and out of the water. Sneakers, water shoes or heavy Teva-type sandals are recommended.

#### Do you offer training?

In June, July and August, the **Blackstone** Valley Paddle Club holds "Introduction to Paddling" nights for paddlers interested in learning basic skills. The Flatwater group also holds Basic Flatwater Paddling classes that cover basic strokes and rescue techniques.

# **Charles River – Cambridge to Boston Harbor**

Looking back at the 2011 flatwater season, one of my favorite trips was the Charles River paddle from Cambridge into Boston Harbor. Louise and Cheryl led a long and beautiful round trip paddle that was unlike any trip I've been on in my four years with the club. The trip was different in several ways:

- It was a much further north than we usually venture.
- It was in a much more urban setting than any other trip. Even the Providence River trips have a section of relative wilderness compared to downtown Boston.
- It involved playing "dodgems" with two fleets of sailboats.
- It included paddling through locks, under a drawbridge and crossing under three MBTA train lines.
- It was also the only trip I have been on which included two encounters with armed law enforcement officials, but we'll get to that later.

The only navigation issues occurred in attempting to find the put in. Early arrivers watched from the put in as kayak laden cars, we knew must be part of our group, drove back and forth on Memorial Drive in futile attempts to find the designated parking lot. Eventually everyone was assembled and we embarked on our urban excursion.

We paddled downstream under the BU Bridge along the Cambridge side of the river passing Boston University on the far right bank. We continued past MIT on the left and crossed under the Harvard Bridge (aka Mass Ave Bridge or MIT Bridge) which is just over 364 Smoots long (Google it), making it the longest bridge over the Charles. The views of the Back Bay area and Beacon Hill with the State House Dome from this spot in the river were spectacular, but much of the group's attention at this point was focused on avoiding several dozen sailboats. The timing of our paddle coincided with two community boating sessions, one from each side of the river. There were no mishaps as our experienced paddlers deftly avoided the amateur sailors by staying close to shore on both sides of the river. We regrouped just before the Longfellow Bridge with its distinctive "salt and pepper" shaped towers and Viking ship carvings on the central piers. Passing under the bridge and the T's Red Line we had a close up view of the work being done to restore the steel arches supporting this beautiful bridge.

We continued downstream past the Museum of Science, under the O'Brien Highway Bridge, the T's Green and Orange Lines and several other train bridges including a drawbridge and another on a huge turntable. The next major landmark was the Zakim Bridge (aka the Bunker Hill Bridge). The views of this cabled bridge from below and the Bunker Hill Monument, the model for the bridges cable towers, were fantastic. Approaching the locks which control water flow and entry to Boston Harbor, the trip leaders signaled the lock operators with an air-horn. Some of us were a little apprehensive in the locks but the 3-4 foot change in water level was uneventful and almost imperceptible.

Passing out of the locks and around a bend to the right we had a great view of the Boston (TD) Garden with its Bruins Championship Banner. We then crossed under the Charlestown Bridge (and part of the Freedom Trail) crossing the river to approach The Constitution, aka Old Ironsides, the oldest active commissioned warship in the world, entering service with the relatively new US Navy over 200 years ago. We had thought we would be unable to paddle up to the ship but we did not count on the extra level of security for 9/11. At about 150 yards we were stopped by a patrol boat with armed naval personnel who politely, but firmly, told us we should come no closer. Being generally peaceful and law abiding by nature (and significantly out-gunned), we continued past Old Ironsides and began looking for a place to stop for lunch.

We stopped for lunch just past the Constitution turning left into what turned out to be part of the Charlestown Navy Yard Historic National Park. A quick Google search will provide lots of information on the old navy yard including a list of the many ships built there.

We sat in front of a large stone building built in 1854 used for ship construction and repair situated between two drydocks and next to the USS Constitution Museum. To one side of us was the drydocked Cassin Young, a decommissioned destroyer which saw action in WWII (surviving two separate kamikaze hits at Okinawa) and Korea and is now open to visitors. It is named for Captain Cassin Young, awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for action at Pearl Harbor and later killed in the naval battle around Guadalcanal. Exploring the area we discovered old

pieces of The Constitution, likely from the recent restoration.

After a restful lunch break, we began the paddle back upstream passing back through the locks and under the many bridges. The sailboats were off the water when we returned, simplifying the trip. We paddled along the Boston bank with great views of the Back Bay and Cambridge across the river. We passed the Boston Community Boating docks and entered the enclosed section of the river near the Esplanade, intending to

stop at the Hatch Shell, site of the July 4<sup>th</sup> concerts and fireworks. As we approached what we later found out was a 9/11 memorial event at the Hatch Shell, we encountered a Boston Police boat blocking our path. The officers again advised that we should approach no closer and go back the way we had come in, which we did. Continuing along the Boston side we then cut across the river arriving on the Cambridge side near the BU Bridge.

We found the takeout and were back on shore about five hours after we put in, tired and happy after a great paddle. I and many others look forward to doing this trip again. Thanks Louise and Cheryl!

There is also a new Wilderness Resources Page which gives you lots of detailed information. It also includes a gear checklist so you don't forget anything, and sample float plans to let others know where you will be and when you plan to get back. Planning a trip includes a couple methods to figure out just how long it will take to complete the trip. Other subjects include Planning meals, PFD's, First Aid and medical information, dangers you could encounter, and many other subjects.

We encourage all of our members to review this information to see if it is of interest to you. As with the other groups, the information for Wilderness Paddling is provided to help our members to enjoy their paddling adventures, by providing information that will help make their trips safe and enjoyable.
