# **West Grand Lake in Maine**

An email came in from Mike. He was in need of a fix and was suggesting a bootleg canoe trip. The email had some details but left so many questions. Then more emails started to fly. We would leave Sunday for Maine for four to six days of paddling and return whenever. We would Paddle West Grand Lake, Junior Lake as well as several others and one or two portages. We only had four paddlers so we posted the trip on the message board and got 2 more responses. The trip was on however one paddler had to back out which meant only 5 paddlers would be able make it.

Early Sunday morning four of us met at Mike's house. Bill and Mike would travel together and paddle Mike's Mad River Explorer. The two Jim's each had solo canoes. We hit the road about 8:30 AM, which is early for us and met Tommy just north of Boston. He would be paddling his Bell Magic. We were off to North East Maine.

It was shortly after 4:00 PM when we pulled into West Grand Lake. We decided it was too late to start paddling, so we drove down about 14 miles of dirt roads to check out several campsites. The only campsite that was available was at the Dennison Portage ('Dobsis') on Sysladobsis

Lake. It was a beautiful campsite, large enough for several Boy Scout Troops, but it was empty so we had it to ourselves. After supper we sat around the campfire and shared a little Sailor before turning in for the evening.

Monday morning we were up early and drove back to the West Grand Lake Boat Ramp. With everyone ready we paddled north through West Grand Lake into a slight head wind. A short time later we stopped at Kole Kill Island to check out a campsite. A sign on the island stated No Fires and No Tenting (whatever that means). We continued to paddle north.

Just off Norway Point, Mike pointed out a large rock in the middle of the lake. The rock had steel handles and a rope which could be used to climb onto the rock. Mike, Bill and Jim S. all tied the canoes to the rock and climbed up. Bill, also known as Wet Willie showed his stuff by being the only one willing to jump from the rock into the water about 8 feet below. He then repeated it several more times for the cameras.

We continued north through the Narrows and to the west side of Bear Island before heading for Junior Stream. About half way through Junior Stream we noticed a large object, black with a white top sitting on one of the large rocks in the middle of the stream. Tommy, who was out ahead of us was the only one to get a picture of it. It was a Bald Eagle and it flew off before the rest of us were close enough to see any detail. We saw several other Bald Eagles on this trip, but most were too far off to get any pictures.

Once out of Junior Stream and into Junior Lake, we headed northeast to Bottle Island which would be our next campsite. The Bottle Island campsite was large and could

probably handle a group twice our size. After setting up camp and eating dinner, Jim S. and I both decided to take short paddles. He went around the island while I headed up Bottle stream.

The trip up Bottle Stream was a quiet one. I heard some birds that I could not identify. plus a noisy King Fisher that quickly vanished. After about a quarter mile I heard some branches break behind me, so I slowly turned to see what it was. On the north shore a rather small bull moose (as moose go), stepped out of the woods and into the stream about 200 feet from me. He looked around and put his head down and began to eat, never realizing that I was there. I had drifted to within about 100 feet, so I slowly back paddled to give him more room. After many pictures, we paddled back down stream and out to Bottle Island. I had to show everyone the pictures before turning in for the night.

The next morning a large bird in a tree over the campsite woke everyone up with a lot of screeching. We later discovered it was an immature bald eagle. It had started to build a nest right over the campsite. We were intruders and he was letting us know.

After breakfast we would take a trip to explore Scraggly Lake. Jim S. decided to relax around, so just four of us headed north up Junior Lake. We checked out several campsites on some islands near

Junior Bay. None were as nice as Bottle Island. One site was called Mosquito which gave a good indication what it was like at night. We did not stick around for long.

The entrance to Scraggly Island was around the point and south of us in Junior Bay. As we headed south into the bay a tail wind picked up which Tommy decided to take advantage of. With his sail set Tommy was able to take advantage of the wind and leave us far behind.

As we entered Scraggly Lake, there was a large campsite we called the Boy Scout site, as there were indications that the Boy Scouts were maintaining it. This site could handle at least 20 campers and had two fairly new picnic tables.

After checking out this site, we headed east to check out the rest of the lake. At the next site, I decided to take a break as Mike, Bill and Tommy continued to explore. Once back to camp we started planning the next day's paddle which would include the only long portage of the trip.

Jim S. and I were the first ones up as usual and ready to go. We decided to get a head start on the others and see if the moose had returned to Bottle Stream. It was agreed that we would met the others at the start of the portage.

As we enter Bottle Lake and we decided to paddle clockwise to see if we could find a shortcut as the boat ramp was at the far end of the Lake. Shortly after going around a small Island we spotted a ramp between two houses and got out to check it out. A man going by on an ATV said it was OK to use it and gave us directions up to the main road (as main as dirt roads get). As we prepared to portage the others caught up with us. With canoes loaded on carts, we made our way down the road to the boat ramp and reloaded the canoes on Sysladobsis Lake.

We started the trip south on Sysladobsis Lake with a headwind, but about halfway down the wind shifted. Tommy and Jim S. raised their sails for the remainder of the trip while Mike, Bill and I continued to paddle. We arrived at the Dennison Portage fairly early. Mike, Bill and Tommy wanted to continue on, but Jim S. and I had had enough for the day. After several conversations we decided slit up. Jim and I would remain here while the others would continue on.

Jim and I were up early the following morning and set out with the idea of paddling about half the distance to the takeout. We paddled through Pocumcus Lake and back through the Narrow into West Grand Lake stopping several times to rest. We stopped and checked out several campsites but did not find any that we want to stay at so we continued to the take out.

At the take out, we decided that we would spend at least one more night back at the Dennison Portage so we stopped at the general store for ice and other supplies before the 14 mile drive back to the campsite. We set up camp again and made plans for some paddling on Friday.

As we prepared to get dinner ready, Jim S. noticed some dark clouds rolling in. We both pulled out our tarps and got ready for the rain. My tent was set up on a high spot in the field but Jim S. had to move his. We then set my tarp over the picnic table.

Within seconds of setting things up the rain came pouring down. The tarps gave us all the shelter we needed. By about 9:00 PM the rain let up and we turned in for the night.

Friday morning we decided to paddle around Big Island, so we headed for the southern tip to check out the island campsite. From there we headed to Sandy Beach to find the trail to the Fourth Machios Lake. The stream going to the Fourth Machios Lake was very low and covered with blow downs. I made it about 100 feet upstream before turning back.

Next we headed up to the Pines and to check out some of the campsites along the west shore. We tried paddling up the stream to Lower Chain Lake, but had to turn back due to low water. After a short rest we had a leisurely paddle back to the campsite.

After a peaceful evening and a good night sleep we packed up and were ready to have home which ended up being an adventure in itself, but that's another story for another time.

# A Fun Day on the Deerfield River Joint Flatwater/Whitewater Trip

It rained on the way out. It rained on the way back. It even rained during the trip, but we still had a great day on the Fife Brook section of the Deerfield River for RICKA's joint Flatwater/Whitewater trip.

The Deerfield runs 73 miles across southern Vermont and northwestern Massachusetts before emptying into the Connecticut River north of Springfield. It is a beautiful river that cuts a deep valley through scenic mountains and hills. Releases at several hydroelectric dams provide whitewater paddling opportunities for boaters of all skill levels throughout the summer.

Advanced paddlers often head to "The Dryway" in Monroe Bridge. This is a class III-IV section of river for experienced whitewater paddlers. For us, the Fife Brook Section is more appropriate. It runs 9 miles from the Fife Brook Dam down to the Shunpike Rest Area in Charlemont. It is mostly quickwater and class I/II rapids, with the exception of Zoar Gap in the middle which is class III.

We had a nice group of paddlers from the whitewater, flatwater and sea kayak groups. The release was 1,100 CFS – a

great level. We ran the shuttle and got to the put in around 11:00.

This was our first joint trip on the Deerfield River since Hurricane Irene caused extensive flooding last year. For those familiar with this section of the river, the flooding caused a lot of changes:

- Hangover Helper at the start of the run is bigger, but there is an easy line to the right.
- Carbis Bend has a much smaller surf wave, and the midstream rock that was great for side surfing is gone.
- The wave train and surf hole above the railroad bridge at Freight Train are gone, although a new surf spot developed at the ledge just downstream
- Pinball is unaffected, but the wave trains and surf spots below it around Miami Beach are gone.

Some of the biggest changes occurred around Zoar Gap. The Gap is now considerably narrower, and the sneak route on the far right is gone – filled with rocks from the reconstruction of the road above.

Once on the river, everyone ran Hangover Helper without incident. That got our confidence up, and we began working our way downstream. Whitewater paddlers who were familiar with the river acted as safety boats, and we ran the rapids as a group – completing one rapid before moving on to the next. We did have a couple of swims along the way, but both swimmers handled it great and were quickly rescued.

We took out above Zoar Gap and helped anyone not interested in running the Gap to portage their boats. Once that was done, five whitewater paddlers and one sea kayaker ran the Gap. The easiest line is now center right. The four kayaks made it through without incident. The two canoes (including me) both swam. I drifted too far to the left and swamped in the big hole below "Oh Shit Rock". Fortunately, Bob and Andy were nearby and helped to push my boat into a nearby eddy – saving me a long swim.

The rest of the run down to the Shunpike Rest area was uneventful. At 4:30, we pulled off the river and got everyone back to their cars. It's a long ride home, but for such a great day, it's worth it. I can't wait to do it again.

# What does the Narrow River Preservation Association (NRPA) represent?

Our mission is preserving, protecting and restoring the Narrow River watershed.

#### How active is your group?

NRPA maintains 14 watch stations, holds awesome education graduate courses, provides scholarships and science fair awards, oversees all building permits and works closely with the Narrow River Land Trust.

# What is the most interesting or picturesque place on your watershed?

We have helped compile <u>kayak routes</u> in conjunction with <u>Rhode Island Blueways</u> that feature the historic Pettasquamscutt Rock, the historic Gilbert Stuart Homestead and the view from Sprague Bridge.

# What has been your greatest achievement with this group or any other conservation group that you

#### have belonged to?

Some of our achievements include seeing three of eleven detention ponds being completed as well as having the majority of homes tie into a sewer system in the Narragansett town portion of the watershed.

# What would be your greatest goals if funding was available?

Overseeing the final leg of the O'Neill Bike Path through Canonchet Farm, continuing the expansion of the detention pond system and creating an improved kayak launch area at Sprague Bridge.

# What could an interested individual do to help or volunteer for your group?

In particular we could use some help from a volunteer Secretary who could take minutes of NRPA meetings

# What overall environmental issue concerns you the most?

Developing non-point pollution programs.

# Does your group offer any educational or recreational opportunities that people should not miss?

Each year we send over 3000 newsletters to Narrow River watershed residents. Paid membership is 400 households. Every 5 years or so we send the *Narrow River Handbook - A Guide to Living in the Watershed* to the entire resident list. Some members who receive newsletters during the year volunteer and work on various watershed committees. We also hold a 10K run and walk road race, a mile turnaround swim and the Pettasquamscutt Kayak River Paddle event.
