Interest Group Q&A

Paddling with RICKA Whitewater

What is the RICKA Whitewater group?

The Whitewater group is the smallest of RICKA's four interest groups. We paddle whitewater rivers and streams across New England.

What is a whitewater trip?

Whitewater trips are designated according to difficulty of the rapids (see AMC River Ratings at right). Our trips range from easy class I trips which are open to any experienced RICKA paddler, to extremely difficult class IV trips which are open to experienced whitewater paddlers only. Most trips are rated class II/III.

An important difference between whitewater and flatwater trips is one of emphasis. A whitewater trip usually takes place on a single section of a river that happens to have the desired level of difficulty. We may spend an hour playing at a single rapid.

How do I find out about trips?

On occasion, RICKA Whitewater trips are posted on the trip calendar on our website. http://www.ricka-flatwater.org/wwschedule.htm

More often, they are posted as "bootleg" trips on the club's message board. http://members.boardhost.com/RI Whitew ater/

Please note that these bootleg trips are not official RICKA trips. They are posted for the convenience of our paddlers. As always, you are responsible for determining if the trip is suitable for your level of experience.

Most RICKA members also paddle with other whitewater groups such as the AMC, MVP or other internet groups.

How do I join a trip?

Official RICKA Whitewater trips are always RSVP trips. Contact the leader via email or at the phone number listed.

Most "bootleg" trips are "show and go" requiring no advanced notice other than confirmation on the message board.

What equipment do I need?

Every paddler will need a whitewater canoe or kayak with floatation, paddle, personal floatation device (PFD) and a properly fitted whitewater helmet. You can find a list of other equipment on our website.

What about clothing?

Whitewater paddling is definitely a water sport, and you should expect to get wet. Since the whitewater paddling season begins early in the spring, cold water paddling gear is required.

Do you offer training?

RICKA occasionally offers a Class II Kayak Whitewater School – details are posted on the website and in the Paddler.

AMC River Ratings

Flatwater - There is little or no current - paddling upstream is easy.

Quickwater - The river moves fast, but is generally smooth.

Class I - Fast moving water with riffles and small waves, but few obstructions.

Class II - Straightforward rapids with wide, clear channels that are evident without scouting. Occasional maneuvering may be required.

Class III - Rapids with high, irregular waves that may be difficult to avoid. Narrow passages often require complex maneuvering in fast current. May require scouting from shore. Self-rescues are usually easy.

Class IV – Intense and powerful rapids requiring precise boat control. May include large, unavoidable waves and holes or constricted passages demanding fast maneuvers under pressure. Scouting is necessary the first time down. Swims will be long, and self-rescue difficult.

Branch River Icebreaker Class II

As a 'nod' to all the years that RICKA ran the RI Whitewater Championships, we are planning to run the Branch River on the traditional 3rd Saturday in March.

We'll meet at the put-in below the Harrisville Dam (access is now at 4 Central Street, Harrisville). This is a 7- mile trip with a couple of short class II rapids depending on water level. Cold weather gear (wetsuit or drysuit) is required. You must have class II skills and be properly prepared for the conditions. Final details will be posted on the Whitewater Message Board when available.





My first RICKA trip – more than 40 years ago By Bill Luther

Many years ago - before there was a Waterplace Park, Waterfire or a River Relocation Project - there was the Woonasquatucket River and the many parking spaces over it in downtown Providence.

Today, we paddle to Waterplace Park as a matter of civic pride - to celebrate how downtown has really changed and how the city has beautified itself. There are a few amongst us who remember what a blighted area this once was, and a very few amongst us who have paddled up the river through the infrastructure that was once there.

Why a handful of RICKA canoeists decided that this would be an exciting trip in the spring of 1978, I will never recall. When someone asked what the widest bridge in the USA was in 1978, the answer was the bridge and parking spaces over the Woonasquatucket River.

If my spotty memory serves me right, I had just returned home from Texas and was following the outdoor activities section in the Providence Journal. I usually followed what was then the Rhode Island Canoe Association (RICA) and their weekend trips.

When I bought a 17' Sears's aluminum canoe, I decided to take part in one of the RICA trips along with my father, a boat builder from East Providence. We were rank green paddlers who never paddled in a straight line. I had paddled a canoe as a Boy Scout at Camp Yawgoo, but just about knew which end of the paddle went in the water. As I recall we put in near the hurricane barrier.

I remember about six canoes leaving and going up stream. We passed under a building which extended over the river. I remember someone telling me to stay bent over because there were long spikes hanging down at head level from the structure above us.

The rest of the trip was a blur until we reached a long gravel bar somewhere near Olneyville Square. The river came tumbling down over the bar in a fast current. I thought that was it - time to turn around. No matter almost everyone in a canoe tried to paddle upstream beyond the current. At the time, I thought that these people were fruitcakes.

I don't remember much else until we hit the large pool of river near the Point Street Bridge. My father and I were zigzagging across the river practicing our antisubmarine maneuvers. A couple of other boaters pushed us aside as we crashed into their boats as they followed a straighter course of direction.

To this day both my father and I blame each other for taking the plunge. We went over in one of the dirtiest sections of the Providence River. We swam alongside our canoe and pushed it into shore. A nearby onlooker asked if we were OK. My father never minced words and replied "What the heck do you think #^@&%#!!!!". It was a memorable first time adventure, and I came back for many more.

Bill is a three-term RICKA President, a <u>Flatwater</u> leader and the Safety & Education Chair.

Waterplace Park in Providence Today

Today, a paddle on the Woonasquatucket River in downtown Providence is one of the finest urban paddles in the country thanks to the completion of Waterplace Park in 1994.

Located along sections of the Moshassuck, Woonasquatucket, and Providence Rivers, Waterplace Park is a four-acre park located in the heart of the city. Pedestrian bridges over the river connect over a mile of cobblestone-paved walkways known as the Riverwalk. The park is home to the popular summertime Waterfire events.

Paddlers interested in paddling in downtown Providence can put in at Bold Point in East Providence and paddle across the Providence Harbor towards the Fox Point Hurricane Barrier. Alternatively, they can put in at the South Water Street Landing closer to downtown, but parking there can be difficult. Once you are on the water, it is a pleasant trip up through downtown Providence to the Cove at the Providence Place Mall.

The cove is a natural amphitheater with great views of the Statehouse to the north and the city's skyline to the south. If the tide is right, after paddling under the Providence Place Mall you can continue up the Woonasquatucket River to Olneyville Square just like Bill did on that RICKA Flatwater trip in 1978.





Quinebaug River - Fabyan to West Thompson

The weather was warm and the rivers were up, so I was looking for an opportunity to paddle. I checked out the RICKA <u>Flatwater message board</u>, and was glad to see that Earl had posted a trip nearby on the Quinebaug River. I figured Bill might be interested in the trip as well, and he was.

The Quinebaug River arises at East Brimfield Lake in Sturbridge and flows generally southeast for 60 miles through MA and CT to Norwich where it joins the Willimantic to form the Shetucket. Much of the river can be paddled as part of the Quinebaug River Water Trail, which is part of the Last Green Valley National Heritage Corridor. Earl had posted a trip on the 5.8-mile section from the Fabyan Dam down to West Thompson – a section that I had never done before.

I would be paddling tandem with Bill, and we had arranged to meet at the MacDonald's on Route 6 in Scituate. When I arrived, I was surprised to see that the MacDonald's was closed. Not only was it closed, but the building had been demolished! I had settle for breakfast across the street at Cindy's Dinner – not a bad way to start the day.

After breakfast, we consolidated our gear in my car and headed off to meet the group at the put-in at the Fabyan Dam. This dam

was originally built in the 1820's to provide power to a carding/fulling mill. It later powered a foundry and then a textile mill. The site has been vacant since the mill was destroyed by fire in 1939, after being damaged in the 1938 hurricane.

As we arrived at the put-in we were happy to see that a nice group had already gathered. We would have 8 boats – 4 canoes and 4 kayaks. We carried our boats and gear down to the river before running the shuttle down to the take-out. Of course, we got a quick group picture at the put-in before heading out.

As expected, the day was sunny and warm, and the river was running at nice level as it alternated between flatwater and quickwater. This is a very pretty section of river that twists and turns through miles of forests and fields.

We stopped for lunch at Auger Brook, which cascades down a rocky waterfall into the Quinebaug River. We hiked to the top to check out the view and the old stone foundation from a colonial sawmill. This site is also along the old Connecticut Path — a Native American trail that became one of the main colonial roads between Boston and Hartford.

After lunch we continued downstream to the takeout at the pair of bridge abutments that used to support the old Blain Road Bridge. This marks the beginning of West Thompson Lake, the mile-long, 200-acre impound of the West Thomson Flood Control Dam.

Since the takeout above the dam was iced in, Earl decided to have us take-out here. We carted, dragged or carried our boats up the long, icy hill to our cars - just one of the many things we are willing to do for a pleasant day on the water.
