Housatonic Foliage Weekend

Fall is a great time for a weekend camping trip. One great option is an overnight trip on the Pawcatuck, but we've done that several times before, and this year we wanted to try something different. I've always wanted to check out the flatwater sections of the Housatonic River described in Jim Cole's book Paddling-Connecticut and Rhode Island, so we decided to do a Fall Foliage Trip on the Housatonic.

The Housatonic originates in the Berkshire Hills of western MA and flows south for 150-miles along the western border of MA and CT before emptying into Long Island Sound. On this trip we would be paddling the flatwater sections from the Covered Bridge in Sheffield, MA to Ashley Falls, MA on Saturday, and Ashley Falls, MA to Great Falls in Falls Village, CT on Sunday.

Bill and I headed out on Friday to check out the put-ins and take-outs before heading over to the campground at <u>Taconic State Park</u>. As we were checking out the put-in at the Covered Bridge a guy on a bike rode up and asked us if we'd seen any tingleys. "What are tingleys?" we ask. "They are UFO's" he says. Apparently this was the site of a <u>famous UFO sighting</u> back

in the 1960's, but there were no UFO sightings or alien abductions on this trip.

When we arrived at our campsite we found Jim Cole waiting for us. He had made the 1,400-mile trip from FL to NY to join us. How's that for determination. None of us had stayed at Taconic State Park before, but it turned out to be perfect. We had 11 campers for Friday and Saturday nights, and a few even stayed through Columbus Day.

On Saturday, we did the 9-mile trip from Sheffield, MA to Ashley Falls, MA. In addition to 11 campers, we had 3 who came out to run this section as a day trip. The river was high after peaking earlier in the week. The higher water was a blessing and a curse - a blessing for the fast moving current, but a curse for the steep, slick banks and soggy lunch spot.

We put in at the Covered Bridge and headed downstream. The river twists and turns through fields and meadows along the

foothills of the Berkshires. There was some nice color, but we probably missed peak foliage by a couple of weeks. The trip was uneventful except for two river-wide logpiles that we had to portage, and a tough hill to climb at the take-out.

After the trip, Bill and I took a detour to check out <u>Bash Bish Falls</u> – the tallest waterfall in MA. We then returned to the campground for a nice potluck supper around the campfire. The food was plentiful and the conversation was great. We turned in early after a long, fun day.

On Sunday, we had coffee around the campfire before heading out for our next trip – the 11-mile section from Ashley Falls, MA to the Great Falls Dam in Falls Village, CT. This trip began where Saturday's trip ended, so we once again had to deal with the steep hill at the put-in. The river had dropped slightly but we still had good current, along with slick banks and a soggy lunch spot.

The main feature on this section of the river is the broken dam in Canaan. Supposedly there is a rapid on the right side that is runnable, but it would have been difficult to scout, so we all portaged on the left. A steep bank at the end of the portage trail was a challenge, but we worked together to get everyone's boats back in the water below the dam.

From there it is about 5-miles to the takeout at the Great Falls Dam and the end of another great trip!
