Adirondacks Trip - 2022

The Adirondack trips that RICKA has run for the last 25 years have been in my opinion, one of the greatest accomplishments that the club has achieved. I don't say that lightly. We still run our weekly flatwater and sea kayak trips throughout the year. We have produced a boatload of experienced leaders who have gone way beyond the skill levels that they entered the club with. We have run programs and events that have extended out into the community and affected even the most casual paddlers. We have created a network of friends among former strangers. In my opinion, though, there have been few things that have lasted this long or approached the level of professionalism that the ADK has.
